### GOLF.

#### Metropolitan Championship to Morris County.

Coming events in golfing seem to cast their shadow before, and the gossip that despite the zeal of Fox Hills the Metropolitan Golf Association amateur championship would go to the Morris County Golf Club became truth yesterday at the meeting of the executive committee. The dates selected for the play over the punch bowl and velvety greens were May 25 to 28. Although a competition that costs the club nothing this year, there was no applicant for the open championship. It is still in the air.

To-day the competition open to professionals and amateurs will begin at the Country Club of Augusta, Ga. There are fifteen professionals to start, nearly all of whom have jobs on courses hereabouts during the Northern season. #### Motor Boat School to Exhibit.

The West Side Branch of the Young Men's Christian Association has taken space at the coming motor boat show, where the methods of instruction may be explained and a small exhibit made of the practical work done at the school. The educational department of the West Side Y. M. C. A. will be the only regularly organized motor boat school that will be represented at the show. The school is now in its fourth year and has given instruction to several hundred students. The work of preparing the auditorium for the exhibits began early yesterday morning. This will give the management three full days and enable the exhibitors to have their displays in proper shape for Saturday's opening. All the big boats which will be exhibited in the Garden were placed in position late last night. This was rendered necessary in order to afford the builders an opportunity to erect the smaller booths, which will be used for motors, models and accessories. The largest boat to be exhibited is a cruising yacht measuring 62 feet. There will be several other splendid specimens of the

type. Contracts for improving the road between Lakewood and Point Pleasant were made by the Ocean county Board of Freeholders of Toms River, N. J., this week. The stretch of road between Lakewood and Burrsville will have a stone surface and the work will be done by John L. Le Compte of Lakewood, whose bid of \$10,487.90 was the lowest. The stretch between Burrsville and Point Pleasant, on the eastern end of the road, will be resurfaced with gravel. The cost of resurfacing this road will be borne by the State and the money will be taken from the road repair fund secured from the fees paid for registering motor vehicles.

The membership of the Minnesota State Automobile Association increased from eight clubs to twenty-six clubs during the last year, and five more clubs have applied for membership affiliation with the State body, according to reports made at the annual meeting in St. Paul recently. The active membership of the affiliated clubs increased from 1,350 to more than 1,900 during the year. The treasurer reported a balance of \$848.33 and it was decided to appropriate \$200 for the erection of sign posts, the money to be expended in conjunction with clubs that will agree to spend an amount equal to that appropriated by the officials of the State body for their sections.

The club representatives at the meeting adopted a resolution favoring jail sentences for drivers convicted of reckless driving. They also favored changes in the local speed regulations so that all of them would conform to the limits set by the State motor vehicle laws. The officers elected for the ensuing year were as follows: President, Ruben Warner; first vice-president, Dr. J. A. Gage, Kenyon; second vice-president, J. H. Hildebrand, Minneapolis; secretary and treasurer, L. A. Wood, St. Paul. The new head of the State association was president of the St. Paul club for three terms.

Edward J. Bedell, County Superintendent of Highways of Albany county, New York, has received authority from the County Board of Supervisors to buy an automobile to be used in inspecting the several hundred miles of roads under his jurisdiction.

The advisability of getting a country clubhouse for the use of members of the organization was discussed at a recent meeting of the Automobile Club of Buffalo, and preliminary arrangements for one were made. Laurens Enos, president of the club, was of the opinion that a home in the country on some road used by motorists could be ready for use by club members by the first of next July.

To this end a committee was appointed, with Harry Thorp Vars, vice-president of the club, as chairman, and the following members: Charles Clifton, Del H. Lewis, E. R. Thomas, George C. Diehl, H. A. Meldrum, Harry M.
